Rigor + Relevance + Relationships = Results

Advanced Placement

- Advanced Placement courses offered at the high school are rigorous college classes which prepare students to take the College Board Advanced Placement exams in May of each year.
- AP courses are regarded as highly rigorous courses for college-bound students who are willing and able to meet demanding reading, writing, and study expectations.
- The College Board Advanced Placement exams are administered the first two weeks of May at a cost of \$87.00 per exam.
- Students are expected to take the Advanced Placement exam.
- Students with financial need may apply for reduced test fees with the school's Advanced Placement Coordinator.
- Based on performance on the Advanced Placement examinations, students may earn anywhere from three to six college credits and/or not be required to take the course at the university.
- Not all universities accept AP credits; some may require high performance on the AP exam to earn credit.
- Students may experience savings in both time and money.

Concurrent Enrollment

- Concurrent enrollment courses offered at the high school are challenging college classes for both high school and college credit.
- Concurrent enrollment courses are more challenging than regular high school courses. There is a greater emphasis on reading, writing, and critical thinking skills.
- Students enrolled in concurrent enrollment classes pay a reduced-per-credit fee to the sponsoring university. (Concurrent enrollment cost per credit: \$65.00; Normal ISU cost per credit: \$169.00)
- Students are expected to register for college credit.
- Scholarships to help pay for college tuition costs are available through the school's Concurrent Enrollment Coordinator.
- Upon successful completion of the course, students will be awarded college credits from the sponsoring university. The credits will be posted on a transcript from the university itself.
- Not all universities accept transferred credits from sponsoring universities. The grade a student earns becomes a permanent part of the student's college record/GPA.
- Again, students may experience savings in both time and money.
